OUR PROGRAMMES

S-BOX by Sakshi is a full service production vertical to foster change and create impact through Design, Performance & Media and to cater to the creative needs of Sustainable Businesses, Development Organizations and CSR Divisions. Empanelled with the NFDC (National Film Development Corporation) as a Communication Agency, SBOX brings Sakshi's experience spanning over two decades in the development sector with an in-depth understanding of policy and systemic change, led by India's top filmmakers and content creators. The result is content that is deeply rooted in experience and empowered for transformation.



THE RAKSHIN PROJECT by Sakshi, in partnership with the Directorate of NSS, Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports, GOI, aims to skill-build 4 Million NSS Volunteers across 40,000 Colleges Pan-India to address and prevent Gender Based Violence with a focus on Child Sexual Abuse, & includes capacity building for preventing community transmission of COVID-19.

The 5 Pillars of The Rakshin Project will include:

- Online/Offline Workshop: Capacity Building Workshops with NSS Volunteers.
- Resolution Mechanisms: Free Counselling, Legal Aid and Creative Expressions for Survivors of Gender Based Violence.
- Sustained Engagement: An Online Social Learning Community.
- Fellowship Programme: 5 Levels spread over 2 years, where outstanding Rakshins at the end will be selected for a Seed Grant to start their own initiative to take this work forward.
- Awareness Campaign: A Social Media Campaign #MakeHomeASafeSpace across all platforms so as to raise awareness on the issue and address Denial, Shame, Silence and Stigma.

| FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S DESK

Day 25. I have not stepped outside my door. And yet, the day could not have been busier!

For some of us, the meaning of work-life balance has finally been enforced. For some of us, the meaning of domesticated has shifted. For some of us, this is a prolonged holiday filled with binge-watching and online networking. For some of us, these days are an opportunity to go within, while for some, these days of lockdown are the most dangerous they have ever lived. Yet for some of us, these are the busiest days, finding innovative solutions to live through this new global reality. Some of us are living in denial, some in fear, and some committed to service before self.

But nobody, globally, is untouched by this pandemic.

As I sum up the year that has been through the report, and envision the future of the organization, I recognize that the world and how we navigate its realities are changing. The quality of our response to this change will largely determine how the new reality shapes up for each one of us. It becomes clear that the need today is for us to evolve, adapt and develop new tools to keep pace with the changing reality.

The question that looms up then is what are the skillful means that we can bring to the table to continue living out the values imbued in the life we knew before COVID 19. How can we continue to cease and desist from blaming the Other? How can we continue to build the fabric of resilience that shields hope from despair? How can we continue to reach out to the conviction within our Youth to participate in building a compassionate, resilient, inclusive generation. All of us are in this together and it's required for us to be united now more than before to cultivate kindness and compassion.

We are inundated with statistics. Before the COVID 19, statistics of child sexual abuse already had frightening numbers like 1 in 2 were survivors of child sexual abuse. This brought home the fact that between you and me, one of us has lived through an experience of sexual violence. Research has established that its long-lasting impact can be equated to that of surviving violence in a high conflict zone. The fact that 90 per cent of cases occur in trusted and familiar circles, made us look around at familiar faces and question if they were aware whether their children were safe at home. The thick shroud of denial and silence was compounded with the fact that 50 per cent cases go unreported as a result of shame and stigma associated with the use of language. Thus positioning the experience of sexual violence as a moral issue, rather than the violation of a constitutional right.

Today, with COVID 19, lockdown, social distancing, fear of community transmission and rise in infected cases and death toll, conflicts are escalating. In 11 days, Childline has received 92000 calls regarding abuse and violence against children across the country. This is quite alarming when the previous statistics evidence that only 50% reach out. If penetrating the family unit was difficult earlier, in this situation it is next to impossible to deescalate the situation through external intervention. While the battle to flatten the curve of COVID 19 transmission is at its peak, all of us are bound by the lockdown. Including the social worker, the legal support, the government worker.

We know, that for each shout out for help, there are many more that are enduring the abuse silently. In today's environment, we cannot reach out through the previously implemented conventional methods.


In response to this situation, the young and the experienced team at Sakshi have converted our initiative into immersive online modules capturing the heart of our message, developing youth to be power enablers of the right action. When the Sakshi Learning & Development Teams were on ground and used conventional methods, they chose innovation over comfort, as role models for the youth inspiring the youth to reach out for a better tomorrow by building in the change today. As we bring our Learning & Development Online, we now utilize technology that is constantly advancing, our Team in full control of that pace – have the agility to make the Online Module a rewarding way forward towards what I envision. Our message is simple and strong that is communicated with passion and commitment, making the online module integral for change. With a maturing support structure enabling the Learning and Development Teams to consistently better themselves and walk the talk, I am encouraged.

Simple and effective messaging, coupled with tools and mechanisms for action. Skills and capacity for behaviour and audio-visual material for information supported with an ongoing conversation through sustained engagement on social media platforms, access to counsellors, and lawyers through resolution mechanisms, and a continuous drive to learn more through the structured Fellowships, The Rakshin Project is reaching out to the Youth, and their families through daily sessions, where they talk with them about their agency to prevent the community transmission of COVID 19 and Child Sexual Abuse.

The seriousness and intensity of questions emerging from the Youth attending the sessions, their subsequent interactions, their zeal to know more, and understand what they can do in such situations to prevent, and deescalate the violence, is evidence that our Youth is ready to shoulder the responsibility of this new world order.

There is hope. There is compassion. There is action.
It's a new world. With new solutions. And we are ready for it.
One day at a time. One Rakshin at a time.
Stay Safe. Make Home a Safe Space.

| THE YEAR THAT WAS : 2019 - 2020

By all accounts the year 2019-2020 has been a remarkable one for Sakshi. A time of unforeseen achievements, it saw our Flagship Project, The Rakshin Project gather wings in its first phase of implementation and reach out to 48 colleges, almost 5000 students in the states of Maharashtra, Tamil Nadu, Telengana, Delhi and Punjab. The year saw our communication for development initiative, SBOX deliver TVCs and films showcased for The Hon Prime Minister during *Pariksha pe Charcha*, and broad cast as part of the campaign for BBBP and POSH. The year saw a strengthening of our relationship with The Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports, GOI; Ministry of Women and Child Welfare, GOI; Ministry of Health and Family Welfare; Ministry of Ministry of Human Resource and Development; Niti Aayog; Department of Women and Child Welfare, and Department of Tribal Affairs, Chattisgarh.

The Rakshin Project by Sakshi addresses the prevention of Child Sexual Abuse under the umbrella of Gender Equality. With the directive by the Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports, Sakshi has built a project around the POCSO Act 2012, with a 360 degree resolution. Our beneficiaries are the NSS Volunteers of 40,000 colleges across India. This Flagship Project was supported by our partners: AU Bank, PFI, DMC, NLC, WCIL, Capri Global Ltd – this year. Their show of confidence in our work gives us the courage to enter the next phase with confidence.

We have never been stronger organizationally speaking. Ranging from mentoring to strategic envisioning, funding to building networks and gaining visibility for Sakshi's work, the extremely supportive governing council is actively shouldering responsibility. The senior leadership is strengthening and bolstering financial and human resource structures, making Sakshi ready to make the leap from a small inward looking team, focused on policy and law reform, to a force ready to reach out Pan India, through online and offline initiatives and deliver its work. The young enthusiastic team members, new into the family are integrating their experience and understanding of the digital virtual world into the programme designed to reach and connect with the 18 to 22 year olds as the primary beneficiaries.

Highlight of the year was the Fundraiser organized to gain visibility for The Rakshin Project within circles of influence. Wives of IAS officers, amateur actors, put up a professional performance of a play written and directed by Smita Bharti, around gender based violence and child sexual abuse. The elite audience included senior officials from almost all ministries, with Amitabh Kant tweeting about the performance, the project and the organization, as the audience gave a standing ovation to the performance.

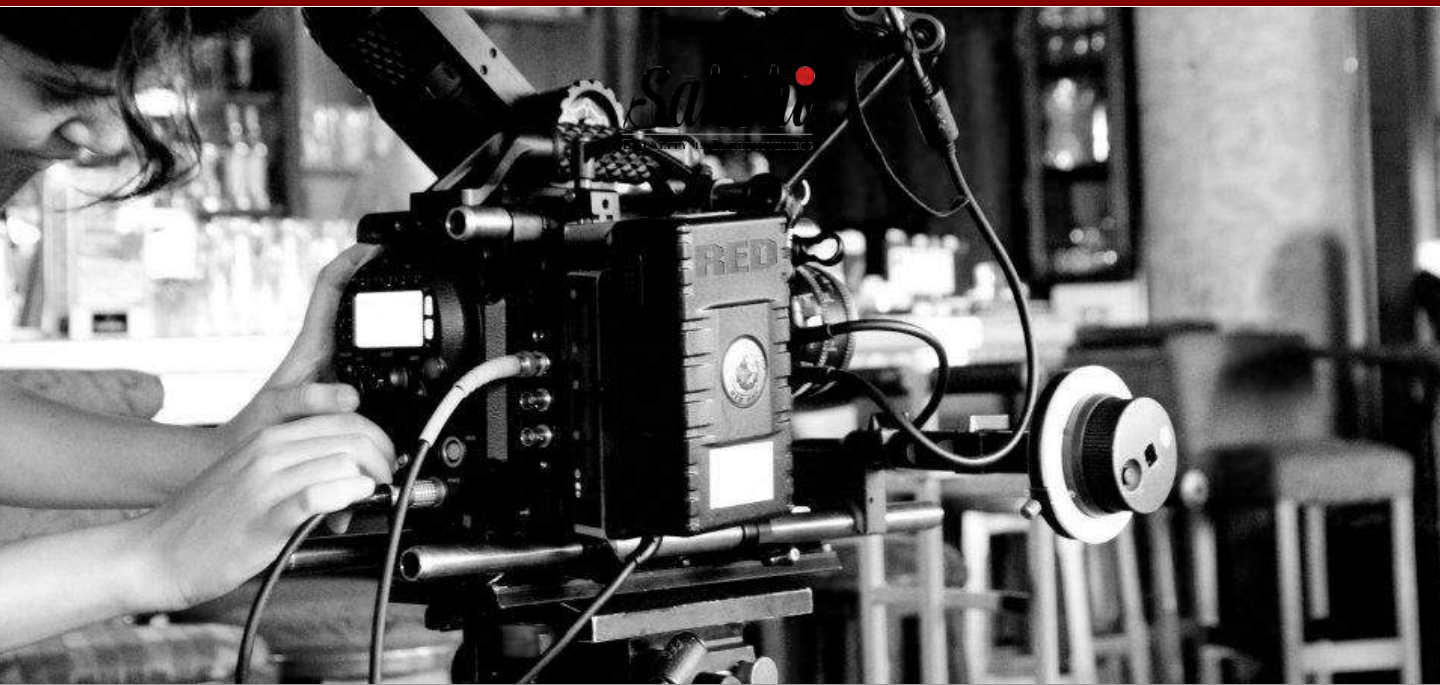
After a gap of three years, Sakshi organized a five day learning retreat for new and old team members at an adventure outbound site, in Wardha. 24TH OCTOBER 2019 – GUPP CHUP GAPP

'Gupp Chup Gapp' was a theatrical play produced by SBOX, directed by Smita Bharti performed by the IAS Officers Wives on the 24th of October 2019 at 7:00pm at Sri Ram Centre Auditorium, New Delhi. The play was organised and performed as a Fundraiser for The Rakshin Project by Sakshi (Redg. NGO 1992) to prevent Child Sexual Abuse.

ABOUT THE PLAY

Four sisters with different temperaments, dreams and ideologies are forced to live under one roof for a year if they want to benefit from their dead mother's property and wealth. As diehard beliefs hilariously collide with age old habits, they enter a war zone where neither of them will pay for the day to day expenses of the house. As a result, they hit upon the idea of bringing in a tenant in the house. One outside force enters their lives like a whirlwind blowing away cobwebs of manipulative habits, patterns, beliefs, ideologies, nurtured over a lifetime; bringing out their vulnerabilities, forcing them to be honest and open. Gup Chup Gapp renders an endearing and entertaining canvas for burning issues of gender equality, sexual abuse, need for self-reliance and an empathetic attitude towards other human beings. The play is a juxtaposition of the serious and the mundane; the marvelous and the absurd performed by the IAS Officers' Wives.

16TH FEBRUARY 2020 – NATIONAL COMMISSION FOR WOMEN

Campaign Design and Execution for National Commission for Women on Domestic Violence and Prevention of Workplace Sexual Harassment (POSH). Commissioned by the National Film Development Corporation (NFDC). Deliverables include:

Production of 01 TVC of duration up to 60 seconds on POSH

Shorter edit of the TVC of duration upto 30 second in Hindi,

Dubbing of 01 TVC of duration up to 60 seconds in 10 regional languages,

Production of 03 Radio Spots of 30 seconds in Hindi,

Language version of 03 Radio Spots of 30 seconds in 10 regional languages

Designing of 04 posters (02 each on Domestic Violence & Prevention of Workplace Sexual Harassment) of size A0 commissioned by the National Commission for Women.



19TH DECEMBER 2019 - MIDLAND CAPITAL MANAGEMENT GROUP

A series of 5 scripts were created that explored the practical issues of the workplace, that can be avoided to maintain prevention of Workplace Sexual Harassment.

Script 1

Who Moved my Cheese is a combination of Quid Pro Quo and Personal Space, a story of a woman who found herself in a compromised position when asked for sexual favours by her boss.

Script 2

Begani Shaadi mein Abdullah Dewaana is based on a Consensual Relationship between a boss and subordinate that is creating a Hostile Workplace Sexual Harassment for other employees with regards to favours and unequal treatment.

Script 3

No Means No has been through 'Nautanki' and rhyme, this upbeat skit explores the concept of Consent and 'No' through the various eras of Bollywood films and music.

Script 4

It's Just a Joke explores Hostile Workplace Environment through the concept of 'Laughter is Deceptive' and 'Proximity / Comments are Subjective'.

Script 5

Ace explores the Prevention of Workplace Sexual Harassment, a skit partly directed by the Management on Midland Capital Management Group.

MANDATE

The Ministry Of Youth Affairs And Sports, Directorate Of NSS Has Directed Sakshi (Regd. NGO 1993) to deliver Pro-Bono Workshops Pan-India and Create Awareness On POCSO (Protection of Children against Sexual Offences) 2012.

The National Youth Policy 2014 that guides the volunteers of the NSS fits into the directive and goals of The Rakshin Project, specifically with regards to the following principles that they embody:

1. Leveraging youth to eliminate unjust social practices
2. Strengthen access to justice at all levels
3. Instil social values and promote community service to build national ownership
4. Leverage existing community development organizations
5. Support NGOs and for-profit organizations working towards spreading values and harmony
6. Create awareness and opportunities to prevent youth from being put at risk
7. Enablement and capability building for disadvantaged youth

PROGRAMME

The Rakshin Project aims to address the denial, stigma, shame and silence associated with gender violence with a focus on preventing child sexual abuse, building a culture of accountability in the country, by exercising the constitutional right to Equality guaranteed to every citizen of India. NSS Volunteers as POCSOA Champions will be capacity built to recognize and prevent child sexual abuse, guided towards mechanisms to resolve their personal experiences if any, and access systems of redress in order to strengthen prohibition.

DESIGN

Attain: Conduct workshops for 40,000 colleges and 40 Lakh NSS Volunteers in 718 Districts of India. Campaign – to Raise Awareness on the issue and POCSOA 2012 & Child Sexual Abuse.

Retain: Guiding attendees towards mechanisms for resolution. Legal Aid, Counselling, Creative Therapy. Provide a platform for spreading the information and skillsets acquired by attendees – Each One Teach Two.

Sustain: Prolonging the impact of the workshops by equipping NSS cells to build their resources to combat CSA. Skill-building & capacity building for volunteers to take the information forward & apply it in the context of the National Youth Policy. Encouraging conversations & group activities around the subject to promote sustained learning using the Rakshin Learning Portal and The Rakshin Fellowship Programme.

RELEVANCE

Schedule VII & SDGs

CSR EXPENDITURES AS NOTIFIED IN SCHEDULE VII

Promoting Education including Special Education and Employment enhancing vocational skills especially among Children, Women, Elderly and Differently-Abled and livelihood enhancement projects.

Promoting Gender Equality, Empowering Women; setting up homes and hostels for Women and Orphans; setting up Old Age Homes, Day Care Centres, and such other facilities for Senior Citizens and reducing inequalities faced by socially and economically backward groups.

The Proposed Project falls within the Ambit of Gender Equality, Education & Health.

HOW DOES IT TAKE THE VISION AND MISSION FORWARD

The program pursues a blueprint for long-term scaling pathway from the start, towards a long-term goal. The pre-pilot for 100 colleges is followed with a pilot across 1000 colleges, following which steps needed to systematically replicate and scale-up will be based on insights/learnings from the pilot, which, will be adapted to suit in-situ conditions.

Continuous monitoring and evaluation, which, tests not just whether the idea works, but also measures progress towards the long-term goal. This includes the demonstration of an increase in quantity – the number of sites (educational institutions) or the number of individuals (volunteers, community members, survivors) reached and impacts on the ground.

Focus on sustained drivers/partners for scaling up and the maintenance of adaptive fidelity in later iterations of the program - changes may be made to the project by partner organizations as they take the project forward. It is critical that the quality of the project is maintained, and to ensure this, Sakshi shall provide technical and implementation guidance to partners on how best to deliver the project.

As the second prong of sustainability and exit strategy, the following interventions with the NSS Volunteers will make the message receivers into message carriers, engaged as proactive citizens to #STOPCHILDSEXUALABUSE.

Learning support to encourage NSS Volunteers to engage in conversations in their college.

Registration on the Rakshin Learning Portal, to access resources and support systems.

The direction towards counselling, legal aid and creative therapy.

Each One Teach Two to sensitize and/or support others in dealing with their experience of CSA.

Equipped with content to spread awareness on gender equality, Menstrual Hygiene Management (MHM) and POCSO in villages. MHM is being focused on as a stepping stone to initiate a conversation around CSA. The ability to remove the stigma, silence and shame associated with something as biological as menstruation and acquire a rights-based language for a conversation is the first step in an organic movement towards speaking up against CSA.


Step 1

| THE RAKSHIN PROJECT: IMPLEMENTATION

Objectives

Capacity building of NSS volunteers, PAN India through workshops offline and online resources.

Access to support, such as; legal aid and counseling for survivors.

Educate, Train, Support and Empower NSS volunteers in order to spread awareness in the community as part of their mandatory service program.

Develop an understanding of protective legislations like the POCSO Act 2012 (Amendment 2019).

To study the consequences of sexual abuse on children and its after effects.

Recognize gender-based violence and child sexual abuse as a violation of one's rights.

Acquire Rights-Based Language for communication.

Create a safe space and platforms to trigger discussion on inequality, abuse and violence thus gather actionable research outputs to craft preventive responses on Child Sexual Abuse.

Build an environment that prohibits and prevents gender-based violence and sexual abuse.

Highlights

We were able to achieve our expectations amongst the students as we could build connections with them during the sessions, which proved to be effective. We could meet the overall objectives in most of the Workshops as the desired impact we wished to achieve from the objectives were:

1. Emergence of a movement of youth as change agents – with a preventive mindset and as active and informed citizens
2. Survivors placed on a path to resilience – physical, emotional and social
3. Shift in mindset, behaviour and/or triggering of action against inequality, abuse and violence in communities
4. Strengthened ecosystem through collective impact
5. Collaborations and strategic investments for prevention

Challenges

Space Constraints – even though there were a large number of students, the colleges could not accommodate the Workshop in their auditoriums for the most part.

Technological Disruptions – colleges provided an older set of technology that was not compatible with the technology we use. Some colleges had a locked projector set up.

Shy students – considering the forward communication of our workshops, it took the first 30 to 45 minutes to gather student participation since they did not have a language to express themselves on this sensitive subject.

Far Locations – wherein mode of transportation was either not available or not cost effective for those locations.

COVID-19 – due to UGC sending a letter to colleges to discontinue social gatherings and study, the workshops were put at halt till we found its solution.

Solutions

Space Constraints – the Trainers were skilled to use space creatively for the workshop – such as using the college corridors to conduct the experiential exercises with the students.

Technological Disruptions – for both disruptions the Trainers solutioned to transfer Data, Presentations and Films to the version of Technology provided by the colleges. They shared content to apply usages of the locked projectors vis a vis using the college technical systems.

Shy students – the Trainers skill and experience drew students to drop barriers of communication and contributed to the workshop with a new rights-based language they accepted at the workshops.

Far Locations – Trainers agility to carry materials and back-pack around the country made the workshops possible and with the desired results such as meeting workshop timelines had been achieved.

COVID-19 – in light of the UGC letter to colleges Sakshi has designed and delivered Online Workshops utilizing the constantly advancing technology that Sakshi is abreast with.

College Roll-Out

Since the Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports have given Sakshi a directive to deliver workshops in 40,000 colleges across India, the Ministry issued the first set of 100 colleges that spills over to be completed by 15th May 2020 due to the unfortunate circumstance of COVID-19. All of the 100 colleges provided to us have NSS Units. The challenge now is to continue with our mission to complete the set of the first 100 colleges. So far, we have completed on ground workshops at 47 colleges and completed the online module for 7 colleges in 13 sessions. We are due to deliver more online modules that are scheduled already. Our target is to complete workshops on ground once social circumstances stabilize, till then and even after stabilization we aim to offer the online module in consistency. Therefore; in total we have 53 workshops to be completed by 15th May 2020. Our efforts are in preparing the online module and a 360-degree approach for students with a sustained conversation for 2 years. Some of the details on how we will achieve the sustained conversation is noted as part of the Post Activation Processes.

| THE RAKSHIN PROJECT: SUSTAINABILITY

THE RAKSHIN FELLOWSHIP

Students can win a social entrepreneurship grant of up to Rs. 1,00,000.

For this, they must complete all Five Levels of the Rakshin Fellowship to win a grant and start their own social entrepreneurship. Students are then at the forefront of social change by creating innovative solutions to social problems as addressed by The Rakshin Project.

Level 1. Rakshin Superstar

Students can create a piece of content, upload it on social media and tag us. Winners will be mentored for their creativity by renowned TV producer Sanjiv Sharma.

Level 2. Each Teach Two

Students teach two people about what they learnt and they should upload a report for this on their login.

Level 3. Rakshin Moderator

Students would organise a discussion with 10 or more people and upload a report for this on their login.

Level 4. Action Practitioner

Students make this conversation a part of their Village Service Intervention.

Level 5. Rakshin Fellow

Once all 4 Levels are completed, Students may apply to be a prestigious Rakshin Fellow where a few chosen ones will get Seed Funding to start their own Social Enterprise to carry this work forward.

RESOLUTION MECHANISMS

We provide survivors with a resolution in terms of access to Creative Expression, Counselling, Legal Aid and a sustained conversation over 2 years, as well.

Creative Expression: is where the students, that have been through the 3-hour workshop, express via any art form their understanding and experience of the workshop. The art forms will be moderated and selected for becoming the Rakshin Superstar mentored by a Bollywood celebrity.

Creative Expression is the first level of the Rakshin Fellowship.

Counselling: would be online for any areas that need to be addressed with surfacing PTSD or other psychological implications for themselves or others that they would like to address. One free session is offered per student.

We will apply a multi-layer approach to counselling:

- 1: Self Help – providing information and an initial conversation on CSA. Information can be in form of FAQs, e booklets – web-based, books, reading materials, podcasts and tool kits for students translated in Hindi.
- 2: Refer to Counselling Partner Firm – offering a 20-minute video session along with guided self-help i.e. working with the students to help themselves with an interactive video intervention.
- 3: Walk into Counselling Partner Firm – these would be face-to-face meetings with their Team of experts for handling students of the region by identifying agencies across India to provide counselling in the several regions we will approach for the workshops & online modules.

Legal Aid: is for students to be aware of the law and know their rights further seek any advice they may wish to around the subject of Child Sexual Abuse – enabling the NSS students with one free session, can make a difference for themselves teaching two more lives.

Legal Aid will also use a multi-layered approach:

- 1: Self Help – providing a list of FAQs and information that can be handy on our website and applications.
- 2: Personalized Email Response to Queries – providing students responses, of which some may be common in nature.
- 3: Refer to a Lawyer – to access knowledge and ability on their legal rights or even address any legal case they may have.

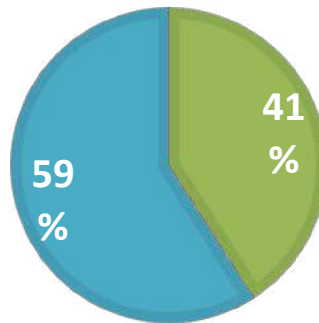
